Caring for Your Pet Rats: An In-Depth Guide

Varieties of Rats

Are Rats the Right Pet for You?

Pet rats are not just adorable; they are also incredibly clean, intelligent, and social creatures that thrive on human companionship. They can make excellent pets for families, but they require significant attention and care. Daily social interaction is essential, along with at least one hour of exercise outside their cage. Before welcoming rats into your home, ensure everyone in the family is enthusiastic about the commitment involved.



Are Rats Suitable for Children?

Rats can be a great pet option for children due to their larger size compared to smaller rodents like hamsters, making them easier to handle. Many rats enjoy the attention and affection they receive from humans. However, it's crucial that an adult supervises interactions to ensure the rats are treated gently and receive the proper care they need.

How Long Do Pet Rats Live?

On average, pet rats have a lifespan of approximately **two and a half years**. During this time, they can become cherished members of your family.



Do Rats Need Company?

Yes, rats are inherently social animals and thrive in the company of their own kind. Keeping a rat alone can lead to loneliness and depression. To avoid unwanted litters, it's best to adopt a pair or a group of the same sex. If you opt for a mixed-gender group, ensure that the male is neutered to prevent breeding.



Tip: Male rats typically get along well if they have been raised together. However, if conflicts arise, consult with your veterinarian about the possibility of neutering, which may alleviate tensions.

When Do Rats Sleep?

As nocturnal creatures, rats are most active during the night and at dawn or dusk. This active schedule means you'll need to consider where to keep them. They prefer a location where they can see and hear you, as they enjoy companionship, but you'll also want to ensure they won't disturb your sleep!



Where to Get Rats

Animal Charities: Many rescue centres have rats in need of loving homes. Generally, these organisations will rehome rats in pairs or groups, but single rats looking for companionship are also available.

Breeders and Pet Shops: If you choose to purchase from a pet shop or breeder, keep the following tips in mind:

- Avoid buying rats from overcrowded environments or where any exhibit signs of respiratory distress (like rapid or noisy breathing).
- Ensure any baby rats are at least six weeks old before bringing them home.
- Verify that they have been health-checked by a veterinarian and accurately sexed.
- Separate males and females by the time they reach five weeks old.
- Make sure they are housed in suitable living conditions, with enough space and socialisation.

How Much Do Pet Rats Cost?

If you adopt from a rescue organisation, there will typically be a rehoming fee per rat, which often covers veterinary checks and behaviour assessments. If you opt for a pet shop or breeder, expect to pay between **£15 to £25** for each rat.



What Supplies Do You Need for Your Rats?

To create a safe and stimulating environment for your rats, gather the following essentials:

- **A Suitable Wire Cage:** Large and well-ventilated, allowing for plenty of climbing space.
- **Appropriate Bedding:** Comfortable and safe material.
- **Quality Food:** A balanced diet designed specifically for rats.
- **Food and Water Bowls:** Earthenware or stainless steel options work best.
- **Water Bottle:** Ensure they have a constant supply of clean water.
- **Nest Box:** A cozy hideaway for resting and sleeping.
- **Playtime:** Time outside their cage for exercise and exploration.
- **Toys:** Engaging items to keep them entertained.
- **Carrier:** For vet visits or transportation.

Rat Cages: Creating a Comfortable Home

The best housing option for your rats is a spacious wire cage. The ideal size for two to five rats is at least **90cm (L) x 60cm (D) x 120cm (H)**, with solid flooring to prevent injury to their feet. Avoid using aquarium-style glass cages as they lack proper ventilation, and be sure not to use hamster cages, as they are generally too small.

Where to Keep Your Rats



Rats can be sensitive to their environment, so it's essential to house them thoughtfully:

- **Indoors:** They should be kept indoors, as outdoor conditions can be too harsh.
- **Temperature Control:** Ensure they are away from drafts and direct sunlight to protect them from extreme temperatures.
- **Visibility and Noise:** Place their cage somewhere they can see and hear you, but away from loud noises or vibrations that might stress them out.

Bedding Options

Safe bedding materials for your rats include:



- Dust-extracted paper-based bedding

- Non-aspen wood chips
- Cellulose-based chips

Bedding to Avoid: Steer clear of wood shavings or sawdust, as these can lead to respiratory issues. Fluffy bedding is also dangerous; it can get wrapped around their feet and cause injury, and it doesn't break down if ingested. Additionally, avoid any bedding with added fragrances.

Providing Shelter

Rats need a nest box for sleeping and relaxation. A simple cardboard box filled with shredded paper bedding will provide them with a safe space.

Litter Training Your Rats

Rats can be litter trained with patience. Use rat-safe litter distinct from their bedding to help them recognise the designated area. Once you observe where they prefer to go, place some of the new bedding there to encourage them to use that spot.



How Often to Clean Your Rat's Cage

Check the cage every few days to remove dirty bedding, which is crucial for preventing respiratory issues. A complete clean should be performed weekly using a pet-safe cleaner.

Cleaning Tips:

- Retain some of their familiar bedding to help maintain their scent, reducing stress.
- Keep their cage in the same location during cleaning.
- Minimise loud noises during cleaning, as rats are sensitive to sound.

Steps for Cleaning a Rat's Cage

1. Wait until your rats are awake to start cleaning.
2. Remove your rats from the cage for exercise or place them in a carrier.
3. Take out any ropes, hammocks, or toys, cleaning them as needed.
4. Scoop out bedding and debris with a dustpan and brush.
5. Use a pet-safe disinfectant to spray the cage, then wipe down and rinse thoroughly with warm water.
6. Allow the cage to air dry for around 30 minutes.
7. Clean food bowls and the water bottle with warm water and a bottle brush.

Finally, reassemble their home by:

- Adding new bedding.
- Reintroducing toys (vary their placement for added interest).
- Providing fresh food and water.



Enrichment for Pet Rats: Keeping Them Active and Engaged

Enrichment Outside Their Cage

Nutrition for Pet Rats

Tumours: Rats, particularly females, are prone to tumours as they age. If you discover a lump, consult your veterinarian to determine the best course of action, including the possibility of surgical removal.

Grooming Needs

Rats are naturally clean animals and spend considerable time grooming themselves. However, they may occasionally need assistance:

- **Tail Care:** If their tails become dirty, clean them gently using mild animal shampoo or unscented baby wipes.



Breeding Considerations

Rats can start breeding as early as **five weeks old**, producing large litters. Females can become pregnant again shortly after giving birth, making it crucial to keep male and female rats separate unless the males are neutered.

Neutering

It's advisable to keep rats in same-sex pairs or groups to prevent unwanted litters. If you have a mixed-gender group, neutering the males is essential to avoid breeding. Neutering can also reduce aggression and fighting behaviours. Always consult your veterinarian for further information about the procedure.

Understanding Rat Behaviour

If a new rat must be introduced (for example, after the death of a cage mate), be prepared for potential aggression initially, which may subside as they become familiar with each other. However, if they cannot coexist peacefully, they may need to be housed separately.

Addressing Aggression Among Rats

If your rats show signs of aggression, consider the following strategies:

- **Resource Distribution:** Ensure there's plenty of food, water, and hiding spots to reduce competition.
- **Cage Design:** Provide a multi-level cage with shelters that have multiple exits to allow for escape routes.
- **Separation:** If fighting persists for several days or if injuries occur, you may need to separate the rats temporarily.

Important: Unusual fighting behaviour in an established group may indicate a health issue or pain. In such cases, consult your vet for advice.
