Start with a Registered Vet



First things first: make sure your vet is registered. It's illegal for anyone who isn't officially recognised to practice veterinary medicine. The Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons (RCVS) is the governing body here, and they make sure that qualified vets have either "MRCVS" or "FRCVS" after their names. You can easily check if your vet is registered by visiting the RCVS website.

The RCVS also has a fantastic Practice Standards Scheme. This program accredits vet practices based on the services and specialties they offer. Each practice undergoes a thorough inspection every four years, and they might even have surprise checks in between. Look for the RCVS Accredited Practice logo—this tells you the practice meets high standards. If you need help finding a vet nearby, the RCVS site has got you covered!

Get Personal Recommendations

Next, talk to fellow pet owners. Personal recommendations can be incredibly valuable! Ask around in your community to see what others think about their vets. Just keep in mind that different types of pets have different needs, so consider whether the recommendations are from folks with pets similar to yours.

Consider Distance and Location

When choosing a vet, think about the distance from your home. It's much easier if the practice is close by—especially during an emergency. Quick access to a vet can make all the difference! Look for a practice that's not only nearby but also conveniently located near public transport if you don't drive, or check if they have parking available.



Check Opening Hours

Most vets arrange for emergency care outside their normal hours, but they might not be able to provide this at their own practice. It's a good idea to ask where your pet would be treated in an emergency. If you work long hours, you might want to see if the practice has evening or weekend hours. And if your pet needs to stay overnight, check whether there's staff on-site to monitor them.

Look at Their Bedside Manner

Every pet owner wants to ensure their beloved animal is in caring hands. When you visit, pay attention to how the staff interacts with your pet. Do they treat them with kindness and respect? Even if some restraint is necessary for treatment, rough handling is never acceptable. Also, consider how well they communicate with you. Are you being kept in the loop about what's happening? If you need to administer medication, are you given clear instructions?

Think About Pricing

Veterinary costs can vary quite a bit based on location, facilities, and other overheads. Make sure to ask about the typical costs for routine treatments so there are no surprises later on. If your pet requires surgery, find out if there will be any additional fees for follow-up care. Pet insurance can be a lifesaver, helping to ease the burden of unexpected vet bills. Know About Specialist Vets

While most vets handle a range of medical and surgical procedures, there might be times when a specialist is needed—like if your pet requires an MRI or has a complicated injury. Also, if you have a unique or exotic pet, it's important to find a vet experienced with that species.
