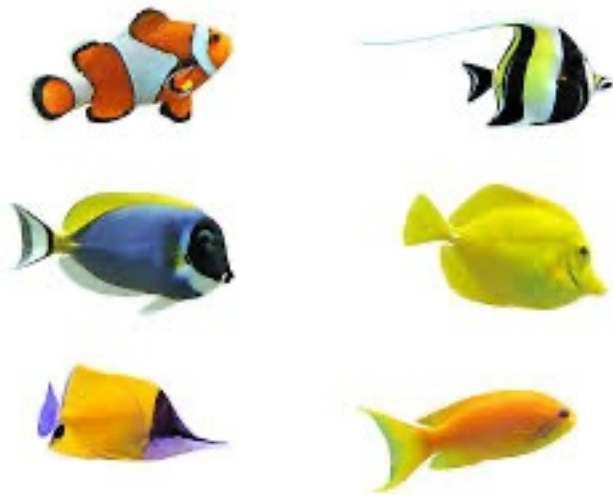


Choosing Your New Fish
