

Common Cat Poisons and Toxins

Painkillers

Your vet may prescribe human medicines in some cases, but the dosages are complex and should never be attempted at home.



Mice and Rat Poison

Rodenticides can pose a significant risk to your cat, whether they come into direct contact with the poison or eat a rodent that has ingested it. If you have a furry friend, consider using pet-safe methods for pest control instead.

Flea or Tick Products

When it comes to flea and tick treatments, be cautious! Products meant for dogs can be harmful to cats, as can incorrect dosages or using multiple treatments at once. It's best to get these products from your vet, but if you buy them elsewhere, follow the instructions closely.



Lilies

Lilies are beautiful but highly toxic to cats. Just a speck of pollen on their coat can cause a severe reaction. It's best to keep these flowers out of your home, especially if you have kittens or indoor cats who may be tempted to nibble on them.



Antifreeze

If you're working with antifreeze, ensure your cat is safely away from it, and store it securely. Clean up any spills immediately to prevent any accidental contact.

Paint Remover

When using products like white spirit or turpentine, make sure your cat is in another room. If they happen to get paint on their fur, don't try to remove it yourself—let the vet handle that!

Slug Pellets

If you need to control slugs, opt for a non-toxic method. Alternatively, cover treated areas with chicken wire so your cat can't access them.

Coal/Tar-Based Products

This includes substances like creosote and certain disinfectants. While most diluted cleaning products are safe when used correctly, it's wise to keep them out of reach and consult your vet if you think your cat has ingested a significant amount.

Onions



Onions are a sneaky culprit, as they contain toxins that can harm your cat, even in small amounts. While it might seem like a nice treat to share table scraps, it's best to stick to cat-specific treats, especially since many human snacks are high in calories and fat.

What Should I Do If I Think My Cat's Been Poisoned?

If you suspect your kitty has gotten into something harmful, don't panic, but do take action. Most household items aren't highly toxic in small amounts, but it's always better to be safe. Call your vet immediately and, if possible, identify the substance. Having the packaging handy can help the vet provide the best advice.

If you've seen your cat chewing on something suspicious, take samples with you and note when it happened and any symptoms they're showing. Wrapping your cat in a towel or using a Buster collar can help prevent them from licking harmful substances off their fur.

Never try to induce vomiting without consulting your vet first, and avoid giving your cat human medications. If your cat is staggering or having a seizure, clear the area of any hazards and create a calm, dark environment.
