What Is Feline Diabetes?

Insulin is responsible for helping glucose (which is just a fancy word for sugar) enter the cells, where it fuels their little bodies. When insulin is lacking, your cat struggles to keep blood sugar levels balanced. When blood sugar spikes too high, it's called hyperglycaemia, and if it drops too low, it's known as hypoglycaemia.

Types of Diabetes in Cats

Most cats dealing with diabetes have what's known as type 2 diabetes. This form is linked to issues in the pancreas and is quite similar to what we see in humans. On the flip side, type 1 diabetes, which occurs when the immune system attacks insulin-producing cells, is very rare in cats.

Who's at Risk?

While diabetes can affect any cat, certain factors increase the risk. Older cats, particularly those that are overweight or less active, are the most vulnerable. If your feline friend is a male or belongs to certain breeds like the Burmese, they might also have a higher chance of developing the condition. Additionally, long-term medication for other health issues can make your cat more susceptible.

Recognizing the Symptoms



Now, what should you look for? Common symptoms of diabetes in cats include:

- **Increased urination:** The excess glucose draws more water into the urine, leading to frequent trips to the litter box.
- **Excessive thirst:** As your cat loses more fluids, they'll naturally drink more to keep up.
- **Increased hunger:** Even though your cat is eating more, their body isn't properly using the sugars from food, leaving them feeling famished.
- **Weight loss:** This can be surprising since their appetite is up. Essentially, their body can't absorb the necessary calories, causing them to lose weight.

Other signs might include a poor coat, weakness, or even vomiting. If you notice any of these symptoms, it's best to consult your vet.

How Is Diabetes Diagnosed?

If you suspect diabetes, your vet will conduct some tests to confirm the diagnosis and rule out other conditions. They may take a urine sample to check for glucose; finding it there is a strong indicator of diabetes. Blood tests will also reveal glucose levels, which will help in making an accurate diagnosis.
